PROFESSIONAL EXCELLENCE IN A Formative Christian Community

Within a community of attentive faculty and supportive peers, MSMFT students at Fuller's School of Psychology are formed to serve as skilled therapists with a theological understanding that richly informs their work.

INTEGRATION

Fuller's MSMFT program equips students with the theoretical and practical resources to understand and intervene in the complex challenges of family systems, with curriculum that guides them to serve others as a Christian vocation of peacemaking that furthers God's kingdom. Faculty lead students in their personal development of four clinical virtues: humility, compassion, hope, and self-care. While offering substantive training in marital and family therapy, the program also helps students engage in their own journeys of healing and self-discovery—cultivating a deeper understanding of suffering and the grace to be present with those in time of need.

COMMUNITY FOCUS

Full-time Pasadena students enter the MSMFT program as part of a "cohort," taking the majority of their courses together and sharing the journey of professional and personal development. They also participate in ongoing faculty-led small groups designed to foster clinical virtues and build competence as marital and family therapists.

CLINICAL TRAINING

Fuller's MSMFT faculty actively participate in the clinical training of students through faculty-led consultation/supervision groups and clinical training opportunities. All MSMFT students earn a minimum of 300 clinical hours and have the opportunity to work in a variety of mental health settings, with some receiving Fuller faculty supervision as they learn specific theoretical models at a secondary site.

The MSMFT program can be completed in Pasadena, California, in two years (full-time) or three years (partially part-time), or in Phoenix, Arizona, in three years (part-time). The program meets all academic requirements for licensure as a Marriage and Family Therapist (in California or Arizona) or as a Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor (in California only). Students may also complete coursework toward an emphasis in Medical Family Therapy (MedFT).
