Structured Hours for Academic Credit Updated February 2021

In order to maintain a uniform standard of requirements for all Fuller Seminary courses, the faculty has approved the following formulae in calculating 160 hours of student work required by our accreditors in a 4-unit course.

The base total "hours of work" required in a course may be determined by first counting each classroom contact hour as one hour (if any), with most hybrid courses meeting 20–30 hours.
